Closing Remarks—Riverfront Ballroom Chief Judge Connolly (D. Del.)

District Judge J. Campbell Barker (E.D. Tex.)

Judge Barker was appointed to the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas in 2019. He currently handles cases in the Tyler and Sherman divisions of that court and serves as a visiting judge with the Ninth Circuit and the District of Delaware.

Judge Barker earned a bachelor's degree in computer engineering from Texas A&M University, a law degree from the University of Texas School of Law, and a master of laws degree from the Duke University School of Law. Before taking the bench, Judge Barker was Deputy Solicitor General of Texas, a partner at the litigation boutique Yetter Coleman LLP, a trial and appellate prosecutor for the United States Department of Justice, and a law clerk to the Honorable William C. Bryson and the Honorable John M. Walker, Jr., on the Federal and Second Circuits.

Circuit Judge Stephanos Bibas (3d Cir.)

Stephanos Bibas is a judge on the Third Circuit Court of Appeals. Judge Bibas was previously a professor of law and criminology at the University of Pennsylvania Law School. As director of the school's Supreme Court Clinic, he argued six cases before the Supreme Court of the United States and filed briefs in dozens of others. He graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Columbia University in 1989 with a B.A. in political theory and from Oxford University in 1991 with a B.A. in jurisprudence. He then earned his J.D. from Yale Law School in 1994.

After graduating from Yale Law, Judge Bibas clerked for Judge Patrick Higginbotham of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals and Justice Anthony Kennedy on the Supreme Court and was a litigation associate at Covington & Burling LLP. Thereafter, Judge Bibas served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the Southern District of New York, where he successfully prosecuted the world's leading expert in Tiffany stained glass for hiring a grave robber to steal priceless Tiffany windows from cemeteries. Before his tenure at Penn Law, Judge Bibas taught at the University of Chicago Law School and the University of Iowa College of Law.

Magistrate Judge Christopher J. Burke (D. Del.)

Judge Christopher J. Burke has served as a United States Magistrate Judge on the United States District Court for the District of Delaware since August 4, 2011. Judge Burke's civil caseload predominantly consists of patent litigation matters, and he often oversees civil cases from their initial stages up through and including expert discovery, summary judgement and/or trial. Additionally, he presides over the early stages of criminal felony cases.

Prior to joining the bench, from 2005 to 2011, Judge Burke was an Assistant United States Attorney at the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Delaware. From 2001 to 2005, he was an associate at the Washington, D.C. office of the law firm of Covington & Burling LLP. Prior to that, he served as a judicial law clerk for the Honorable Kenneth F. Ripple of the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit.

Judge Burke is a 2000 graduate of the University of Michigan Law School. He received his undergraduate degree from Georgetown University in 1997.

Judge Burke currently serves as the Chairman of the Federal Trial Practice Seminar, a trial skills development program jointly sponsored by the United States District Court for the District of Delaware and the Federal Bar Association's Delaware Chapter ("FBA"). He also presides over the District Court's criminal Re-entry Court, which focuses on providing oversight, support and assistance to individuals serving terms of federal supervised release. He is the District Court's liaison judge as to the FBA, as well as to the District Court's Federal Civil Panel, which provides representation to indigent parties with civil cases pending before the Court. And he created and oversees the District Court's High School Summer Fellow-ship Program, which provides mentoring to high school-aged youth in New Castle County and exposes those students to the work of the federal court system.

Circuit Judge Michael A. Chagares (3d Cir.)

Michael A. Chagares is Chief Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit and has been a Circuit Judge since April 2006. He is a member of the Judicial Conference of the United States, the governing body of the federal judiciary, and was appointed by Chief Justice Roberts to the Executive Committee of the Judicial Conference. He served as a member and later Chair of the federal Appellate Rules Advisory Committee. Before taking the bench, Chief Judge Chagares was a partner in the law firm of Cole Schotz, P.A., and served as a Hearing Officer for the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund. From 1990 to 2004, he served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in Newark, becoming Chief of the Civil Division in 1999. Chief Judge Chagares served as a law clerk to the Honorable Morton I. Greenberg, U.S.C.J., and has been an Adjunct Professor at Seton Hall Law School since 1991. He has published various articles and is a co-author of the book New Jersey Federal Civil Procedure. Chief Judge Chagares has lectured abroad to foreign judges, officials, and others about the U.S. justice system, judicial independence, and the rule of law.



Judge Jennifer Choe-Groves (Ct. Int'l Trade)

Judge Jennifer Choe-Groves is an Article III federal judge on the United States Court of International Trade in New York City. Judge Choe-Groves began her professional career serving as an Assistant District Attorney in the Manhattan District Attorney's Office. She served in the Executive Office of the President of the United States as Senior Director for Intellectual Property and Innovation and as Chair of the Special 301 Committee for the Office of the United States Trade Representative. Prior to her appointment to the United States Court of International Trade, Judge Choe-Groves was in private practice specializing in intellectual property, litigation, and international trade policy. She was appointed by Chief Justice Roberts of the U.S. Supreme Court to serve on the Judicial Conference Committee on International Judicial Relations. Judge Choe-Groves also serves on the Federal Judiciary's Artificial Intelligence Task Force and the Human Resources Advisory Council of the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts. She also is Chair of the National Tang Moot Court Competition of the National Asian Pacific American Bar Association Law Foundation. Judge Choe-Groves holds a Piano and Composition degree from Juilliard School, an undergraduate degree from Princeton University, a law degree from Rutgers School of Law-Newark, and a master of laws degree from Columbia Law School.

Chief District Judge Colm F. Connolly (D. Del.)

The Honorable Colm F. Connolly has served as a district judge since 2018 and has been chief judge since 2021. His distinguished career spans both public service and private practice. He began his career as a law clerk to Judge Walter K. Stapleton of the Third Circuit, then served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney and later as the U.S. Attorney for the District of Delaware. In private practice, Judge Connolly was a partner at two prominent firms: Morgan Lewis and Morris Nichols.

Circuit Judge Timothy B. Dyk (Fed. Cir.)

Timothy B. Dyk was appointed by President William J. Clinton in 2000. Prior to his appointment, Judge Dyk was Partner and Chair, Issues and Appeals Practice Area, at Jones, Day, Reavis & Pogue from 1990 to 2000. He was Adjunct Professor at Yale Law School from 1986 to 1987 and 1989, at the University of Virginia Law School in 1984 and 1985, and from 1987 to 1988, and at the Georgetown University Law Center in 1983, 1986, 1989 and 1991. Judge Dyk was Associate and Partner, Wilmer Cutler & Pickering from 1964 to 1990. From 1963 to 1964, Judge Dyk served as Special Assistant to Assistant Attorney General Louis F. Oberdorfer. He also served as law clerk to Chief Justice Warren from 1962 to 1963, and to Justices Reed and Burton from 1961 to 1962. Judge Dyk received an A.B. from Harvard College in 1958 and an LL.B. from Harvard Law School in 1961. He was First President of the Edward Coke Appellate Inn of Court from 2000 to 2001 and President of the Giles Sutherland Rich Inn of Court from 2006 to 2007. Judge Dyk is co-author of the Chapter on Patents in the Fifth Edition of the treatise, Business and Commercial Litigation in Federal Courts. He was the recipient of the 2012 American Inns of Court Professionalism Award for the Federal Circuit and the 2016 Honorable William C. Conner Inn of Court Excellence Award. He is a member of the American Law Institute.

Magistrate Judge Sherry R. Fallon (D. Del.)

The Honorable Sherry R. Fallon was appointed as a magistrate judge in 2012, bringing with her a wealth of experience from over 20 years in private practice at Tybout, Redfearn & Pell.

Ret. Chief District Judge Mitchell S. Goldberg (E.D. Pa.)

Judge Goldberg was appointed to the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania on October 31, 2008. Judge Goldberg began his career at the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office where he worked in both the trial and appellate divisions. He later joined the Cozen O'Connor law firm, focusing his practice on commercial litigation. Judge Goldberg returned to the public sector in 1997 as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania where he handled mostly white collar crime cases before the District Court and the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit. Judge Goldberg also served on the Bucks County Court of Common Pleas before his appointment to the District Court. Judge Goldberg has handled over one hundred patent cases as a visiting judge in the District of Delaware.

Bankruptcy Judge Craig T. Goldblatt (D. Del.)

Craig Goldblatt is a judge on the United States Bankruptcy Court for the District of Delaware, where he has served since his appointment in April 2021. Prior to his appointment, Judge Goldblatt was a bankruptcy litigator in the Washington, D.C. office of WilmerHale, where his practice primarily involved the representation of financial institutions and other commercial creditors in complex bankruptcy litigation and appeals. Earlier in his career, Judge Goldblatt served as a law clerk to Hon. Richard D. Cudahy of the United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit and Hon. David H. Souter of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Judge Goldblatt earned his law degree, with honors, in 1993 from the University of Chicago Law School, where he served as Comment Editor of the University of Chicago Law Review. He earned his bachelor's degree, magna cum laude, in 1990 from Georgetown University.

District Judge Jennifer L. Hall (D. Del.)

Judge Jennifer L. Hall has served as a United States District Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Delaware since 2024. Judge Hall previously served as a United States Magistrate Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Delaware from 2019 to 2024. Prior to joining the bench, Judge Hall served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Delaware from 2011 to 2019, including as chief of the office's Civil Division from 2015 to 2019. Judge Hall was a law clerk for Judge Sharon Prost of the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit from 2006 to 2007 and for Judge Kent A. Jordan of the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit from 2007-2008. Following her clerkships, Judge Hall was an associate in the Wilmington office of Fish & Richardson P.C. from 2008 to 2011, where she litigated patent and copyright cases. Judge Hall received a B.S. in biochemistry from the University of Minnesota and an M.Phil. and Ph.D. in molecular biophysics and biochemistry from Yale University, and she received her J.D. and graduated magna cum laude from the University of Pennsylvania Law School.

Magistrate Judge Laura D. Hatcher (D. Del.)

The Honorable Laura D. Hatcher was appointed as a magistrate judge in 2023, bringing with her a strong background in both public service and private practice. Prior to her appointment, she served as an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the District of Delaware. In private practice, Judge Hatcher was a litigator at Richards, Layton & Finger and DLA Piper.

Ret. Third Circuit Judge Kent A. Jordan

Kent A. Jordan is a Director in the Wilmington, Delaware law firm of Richards, Layton & Finger. Previously, since 2006, he served as a United States Circuit Judge for the Third Circuit. Before that, he was a United States District Judge for the District of Delaware from 2002 to 2006. Judge Jordan received a B.A. in Economics in 1981 from Brigham Young University and a J.D. in 1984 from Georgetown University. He was an Assistant United States Attorney and head of the Civil Division in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Delaware. Later, he served as an officer and as a member of the boards of directors of privately held businesses and was a partner in a law firm. He is an Adjunct Professor of Law at the University of Pennsylvania and Vanderbilt University and has served as President of the Board of Trustees of the American Inns of Court Foundation, as well as on the boards of other non-profit organizations.

District Judge John F. Murphy (E.D. Pa.)

Judge Murphy is a judge on the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, sitting by designation within the United States District Court for the District of Delaware. Judge Murphy holds a Ph. D. in chemical engineering from the California Institute of Technology and a J.D. from Harvard Law School. Prior to joining the bench, Judge Murphy worked in private practice focusing on intellectual property litigation. Judge Murphy has also taught patent litigation as an adjunct professor at Rutgers Law School and Villanova Charles Widger School of Law.

District Judge Maryellen Noreika (D. Del.)

The Honorable Maryellen Noreika was sworn in as a District Judge on August 10, 2018. Prior to that time, Judge Noreika was a partner at the law firm Morris, Nichols, Arsht & Tunnell LLP in Wilmington, Delaware, where her practice focused on intellectual property litigation and unfair competition cases. Judge Noreika graduated from Lehigh University in 1988 with a Bachelor of Science in biology, and she earned her Master of Arts in biology from Columbia University in 1990. Judge Noreika graduated magna cum laude from University of Pittsburgh, School of Law in 1993.

Chief Bankruptcy Judge Karen B. Owens (D. Del.)

Chief Judge Owens has served as a United States Bankruptcy Judge since 2019 and assumed the role of Chief Judge earlier this year. Prior to her appointment, Judge Owens was a director in the Bankruptcy and Insolvency Group of Ashby & Geddes, P.A. where she maintained a diverse practice representing corporate debtors, estate professionals, secured and unsecured creditor constituencies, and other interested parties in various reorganization and liquidation proceedings and bankruptcy-related litigation. Judge Owens received an undergraduate degree from Pennsylvania State University and earned her law degree, summa cum laude, from American University, Washington College of Law.

Bankruptcy Judge Brendan Linehan Shannon (D. Del.)

Judge Shannon has served as a United States Bankruptcy Judge for the District of Delaware since 2006. In addition to managing a full docket of complex chapter 11 cases, Judge Shannon also continues to manage the chapter 13 case docket. Judge Shannon received his undergraduate degree from Princeton University and his J.D. from the Marshall-Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary. Judge Shannon is also an adjunct professor in the Bankruptcy L.L.M. Program at St. John's University School of Law and has previously taught at Widener School of Law.



Circuit Judge Leonard P. Stark (Fed. Cir.)

Leonard P. Stark was appointed by President Biden to the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit in March 2022.
